PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Professional Development has been terrific this year. The reduced fee has attracted a new and larger audience. To recap, in September, Bob Durso discussed how to manage the technical difficulties of pieces written by Schubert. In December, Scott Burnham partnered with pianist Ilya Itin to analyze and perform portions of Schubert's final sonatas. There were moments when Scott was so connected to the beautiful harmonies, that he appeared to be in a trance.

We will continue to honor Schubert in the upcoming lecture/masterclass given by Frank Levy in April at the Long Ridge Music Center. We have two tentative young pianists registered for the masterclass.

Our programs are all set for next year and are very varied. Sondra Tammam will discuss how to manage the technical difficulties in Scarlatti Sonatas on October 8, 2010; Eugene Kaminsky will lecture on the teaching pieces of Kabalevsky on November 20, 2010 and Shiau-uen Ding will present the lecture/masterclass on Liszt on March 12, 2011.

10th Annual International Women Composers Festival

Patrice Fitzgerald would love to have the benefit of club members' shared knowledge regarding compositions and/or performers in connection with two related events coming up in the spring.

In the Hartford area, she will be producing the 10th Annual International Women Composers Festival. She is the co-chair of one event, the *Concert Pro Femina*, which is to be held on Saturday, March 27th at the Unitarian Society of Hartford.

She plans to present substantially the same concert at the Unitarian Church in Westport, on a March or April date to be announced, probably as the newly formed Fairfield County Festival of Women Composers.

Past concerts have included music for a small chorus, solo singers, solo instrumentalists, or small chamber ensembles. with works by composers ranging from Hildegard von Bingen, Fanny Mendelssohn, and Clara Schumann to Libby Larsen and our own Alma Hamilton.

"We are always looking for new works," Fitzgerald says. "The only stipulation is that the composer is female, and that the compositions can be considered classical, as broadly defined. Typically we set the concert up with perhaps 10 different segments of 8 – 10 minutes each, so no single work can be much longer than that."

For the 2010 concerts she has a tentative list of works which includes a newly commissioned song cycle called "Water Music," a small chamber piece by Elisabeth Jacquet de la Guerre, a choral piece by Alma Hamilton, and some new works for solo voice and organ in Hebrew.

If you have the music as well as the title for something that you think might be appropriate in any of these categories, send it to Fitzgerald.

"We would also like to hear about possible performers. Unfortunately, there is no pay involved, though we would love to learn about possible sources of support — an ever more difficult challenge in the arts!"

Berkovich.

Sean Lee won 1st Prize at the "Crescendo" International Piano Competition. He is going to perform at Carnegie Hall on January 24 and then he is going to be a soloist with the Plainfield Symphony Orchestra performing Concerto # 1 by S. Prokofiev.

Patrice Fitzgerald and Richard Leslie are performing a benefit concert on January 30th at the Unitarian Church of Hartford. On February 13th they will do another benefit concert as part of a dinner dance at the Lordship Congregational Church in Stratford.

On March 6 they are performing as the "Torch & Tango Trio" in Farmington as a benefit for the Vallis Musicae choir tour of Argentina coming up in July (which we hope to be a part of). Patrice and Richard are members of the Chamber Choir at the Unitarian Church in Westport. They have a newly formed group named SCORE - Southern Connecticut Opera Recital Ensemble. Patrice will be part of "From Russia With Love" on 2/14 at the New Britain Museum of Art, singing a Russian art song and a duet from Queen of Spades - In Russian! They will also be singing Broadway songs as part of the Drama Service being put on by the Unitarian Church of Hartford that same morning.

Patrice and Richard are doing a May 7 concert "Jazz with Dr. Joe" at the First Congregational Church of Stratford.

Eugenie Rocherolle's new "Sonata No. 1 for Flute and Piano" in three movements (Hal Leonard) had its first performance on a Connecticut Composers concert in Wilton October 4 with flautist, Moira Crow, and the composer at the piano. The work was performed again on the annual Wilton Kiwanis Holiday Concert December 5.

Eugenie will present some of her new piano collections at MTNA on a Hal Leonard Publishers Showcase. "Piano Trio No. 3: Century Music," a commission from Chamber Music Central of Westport, was premiered March 8 at Trinity Church in Southport by the Trio Esprit. An eight page feature article, "Eugenie Rocherolle: An American Treasure," by Suzanne Guy, appeared in the March/April issue of *Clavier Companion* magazine commemorating Rocherolle's 30 years of publishing piano repertoire.

Accordionist Mary Tokarski to be featured "in concert" with the Prince George's Philharmonic in Largo, Maryland

Concert Accordionist, Mary Tokarski will be the featured soloist with the Prince George's Philharmonic Orchestra at 8:00 p.m. on February 13, 2010 at the Queen Anne Auditorium at Prince George's Community College in Largo, Maryland - Charles Ellis, Conducting.

Tokarski will be performing "Aconcagua: Concerto for Bandoneon and Orchestra" by Astor Piazzolla. The work, commissioned for a 1979 radio broadcast, resembles a baroque concerto grosso. The "tango nuevo" Piazzolla championed during his lifetime is hinted throughout, especially in the slow movement. The finale, a rhythmic Presto, contains a breathtaking melody, and progresses to a powerful, emotional closing.

Performing both nationally and internationally as a soloist, with Symphony Orchestra, and in a duo known as "Buttons & Keys" (with Bulgarian pianist Dessie Vaughan), this year Tokarski has traveled to China to perform with the Mantovani Orchestra; to New Zealand with the Auckland Symphony; and to Arizona, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Texas, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Washington D.C., Tennessee, Minnesota, California, and Nevada right here in the United States.

As a workshop presenter, Tokarski is sought-out by numerous associations for presentations on all aspects of music, performance, and Master Classes.

In February of 2011, Tokarski will appear with the Hamden Symphony Orchestra in Hamden, Connecticut performing Gary Daverne's "Rhapsody for Accordion and Orchestra".

For 20 years she served as Director of Music Education at Tokarski Music Center in North Haven, Connecticut, where she taught piano and accordion, as well as conducted the choral & ensemble programs, and supervised the pre-school programs. Tokarski currently teaches piano and accordion at her home in Northford, Connecticut.

She also served for many years as a Music Educator in the North Haven Department of Education's Early Childhood Development Program at Green Acres Elementary School, is currently 2nd Vice President of the Accordionists and Teachers Guild, International (ATG) as well as on the Board of Directors with both The American Accordionists' Association (AAA) and the ATG which are the two national member organizations of the Confederation Internationale des Accordeonistes, (IMC-UNESCO).
